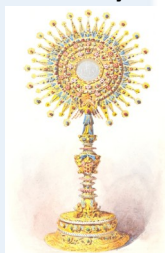

Bulletin Mailing

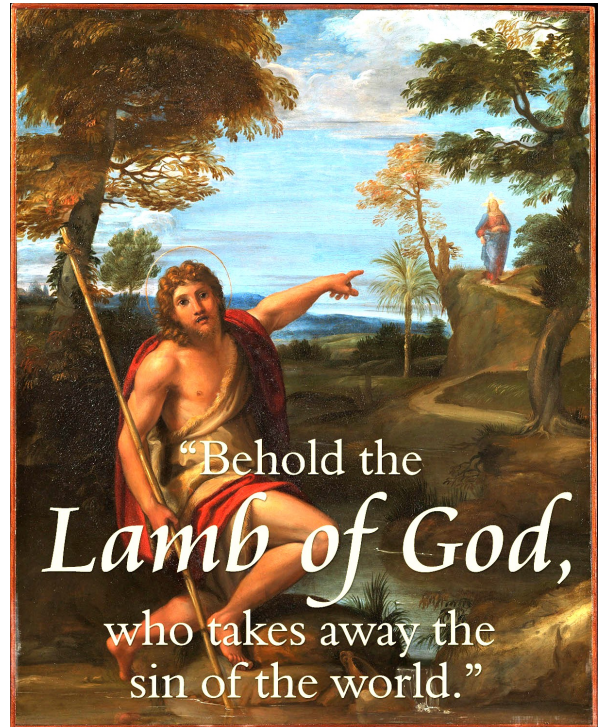

REFLECTIONS

Inspiration Daily - *I Know a Guy*

Before he became an Apostle and author of the fourth Gospel, John was a disciple of an unusual man who lived in the desert and ate locusts. The Baptist, as he was known, explained to his followers that he had been told to make straight the path for the Messiah, to prepare the way of the Lord. What their people had longed for centuries was coming soon, and John the Baptist was called to help the people be ready. John the disciple believed him as did his friend Andrew. So, when the Baptist's cousin appeared on the scene and this compelling figure proclaimed, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world," John and Andrew were prepared to recognize the Messiah. Then Andrew told his brother Peter, and soon after, a Church was born.

John the Baptist's unusual life — from his unlikely conception, to leaping in his mother's womb upon Mary's greeting, to baptizing the Savior Himself — was geared toward helping people know Jesus. He was dedicated to his mission even if the people of his time thought he was a little weird. He was an odd, yet compelling messenger. Even Herod, who would eventually put the Baptizer to death, found himself drawn to John and enjoyed listening to him speak.

John the Baptist got people talking as he set the stage for the greater One to follow. The word about Jesus spread as people told their families and friends about a guy they knew who knew a guy. And the word about Jesus still spreads that way.

We are called to be like John the Baptist, to make straight the path and prepare the way of the Lord. Yes, the world may think we're a little weird sometimes for believing what we do and striving to live out what we believe, but few of us will pay the price John the Baptist did for speaking up about Jesus.

Can we find the courage to be like John the Baptist? Can we live lives of faith that draw the curious toward us, and then urge those people toward the Source of the light? Can we tell the world that we know a Guy who came to make all things new? When we do, we stand with John as he proclaims, "Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God." —Pamela Kavanaugh

The Word in Our Lives - *Behold the Lamb of God*

I wonder if anyone understood John the Baptist when he called Jesus the Lamb of God. Did they associate that name with the paschal lamb whose blood protected the Israelites from the Angel of Death? After Jesus' death and resurrection, the apostles began to understand that Jesus' blood, shed on the cross, freed us all from sin and death. Yet here is the Baptizer already acting like a disciple before Jesus has gathered any disciples or even begun to preach. In today's Gospel, John the Baptist gives us some hints about discipleship.

First, John trusts God with things he does not understand. He says twice that he did not know Jesus, yet he trusts God's revelation that Jesus would "baptize with the Holy Spirit" (John 1:33). We also may not always understand where God is leading us. If you have lost a loved one, are looking for work when no one is hiring, or are dealing with a serious illness, this is the time to trust that God still loves and cares for you.

John also knew that doing God's work meant that God was working through him. Originally John baptized others as a sign of repentance, but he soon came to see that his real work was to make Jesus "known to Israel" (John 1:31). When we try to do what God wants, it is good to remember that God is the one in control and who decides what the result will be. What looks like failure to us can be success in God's eyes.

John's third hint teaches us that a disciple shares his or her faith in God. So John testifies that Jesus is the Son of God. While that sounds obvious to us, it took courage to say that to people who would have thought it blasphemy. Even today, when Jesus is known throughout the world, we still need to share our faith experiences so those without faith may be attracted to it. Even those with faith can be encouraged by our sharing as well. You may be surprised to find that your own faith deepens the more you share it with others. As we point out the Lamb of God to those who don't know him, we get to know him better ourselves. —Tom Schmidt

NOTICE OF OPPORTUNITY TO PRESENT NONTESTIMONIAL STATEMENTS TO BANKRUPTCY COURT

Please take notice that on December 29, 2025, the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Western District of New York (the "Bankruptcy Court") in The Diocese of Buffalo, N.Y. (the "Diocese") entered an order [Docket No. 4471] (the "Nontestimonial Statement Order") granting the request of the Official Committee of Unsecured Creditors (the "Committee") for the presentation of nontestimonial statements (the "Statements") in the above captioned bankruptcy case (the "Bankruptcy Case").

Please take further notice that the hearings for the Statements (the "Statement Sessions") shall be held at the Robert H. Jackson U.S. Courthouse, 2 Niagara Square, Buffalo, New York on the following initial dates:

January 27, 2026 starting at 10:00 a.m. (Eastern)

January 28, 2026 starting at 10:00 a.m. (Eastern)

February 25, 2026 starting at 10:00 a.m. (Eastern)

February 26, 2026 starting at 10:00 a.m. (Eastern)

Please take further notice, that the Committee, in consultation with the Diocese, may seek to add additional Statement Session dates, if necessary, and subject to the Court's availability. Please take further notice that the Statement Sessions will be subject to the following conditions:

- Statements shall be made in person at the Robert H. Jackson U.S. Courthouse, 2 Niagara Square, Buffalo, New York. Persons who are unable to appear in person may request accommodations, including having counsel or another person read a written statement on their behalf, and the Bankruptcy Court will consider whether to grant any other accommodation.
- Statements should not exceed twenty (20) minutes;
- No parties in interest shall be expected or allowed to comment or respond to the Statements;
- No statements or Statements of any party at the Statement Sessions will be considered as evidence in any matter or proceeding, including in the Bankruptcy Case, and no such statements or Statements will carry any evidentiary weight become part of the official record in the Bankruptcy Case.
- The Statement Sessions will not be transcribed by a court reporter. The audio of the Statement Sessions will be recorded but any such recording shall be sealed and not available to the public or any party in any form except upon an order from the Court following a hearing upon notice to any affected persons or their counsel, counsel for the Diocese, and counsel for the Committee. To the extent the audio recording of a Statement or Statement Session is later released or transcribed pursuant to an order of this Court, such transcript or recording shall be sealed pending further Court order.
- Persons who have Sexual Abuse Proofs of Claim in the Bankruptcy Case may elect to be identified only by their proof of claim number;
- Consistent with Judicial Conference policy, no party or member of the public may photograph, video record, audio record, broadcast, televise, or otherwise transmit the Statement Sessions. Any media report concerning the statements made during the Statement Sessions shall not be considered evidence in any matter or proceeding in the Bankruptcy Case.

Please take further notice, any person impacted by the Bankruptcy Case who would like the opportunity to make a statement (a "Speaker") should contact, or, if represented by counsel, should have their counsel contact the Official Committee of Unsecured Creditors DioceseBuffaloCommittee@pszjlaw.com or 212-319-5527 by **January 15, 2026**, and include the Speaker's, or the Speaker's counsel's contact information and the Speaker's interest in the Bankruptcy Case. Please note it may not be possible to accommodate every request at the scheduled Statement Sessions.

Please take further notice, the Committee shall select the Speakers for each Statement Session, and, at least two business days in advance of the Statement Sessions, counsel for the Committee shall email Chambers with the number of Speakers, in order of expected appearance, and the estimated time allocated to each Statement.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

The symbols and actions of baptism evolved around the experience of adults dying to old patterns of life and rising from the waters of baptism as new creations. As for newborn babies, at first it was desired to wait until the following Easter, when they could be baptized, anointed with chrism, and given a taste of the Eucharist in association with adults.

The Church was always willing to baptize adults in emergency situations outside the Easter timetable, and in time, since infancy itself was a life-threatening situation, the baptism of babies became commonplace. As with the "emergency" adult baptisms, it was required that parents bring the child, as soon as health was recovered, to the bishop for the full menu of sacraments.

The very real fear of death for infants thus created a situation in which the three sacraments drifted apart from each other, and away from their original, adult celebration at Easter. Today, at last, we know a great deal about how our practices evolved. This knowledge is reshaping how we celebrate Easter, how we receive adult faith, and how we structure the faith journey of children. —Rev. James Field

What Does the Paschal Candle Represent?

The Paschal Candle represents the Risen Christ, the "Light of the World," symbolizing His victory over death, sin, and darkness, bringing new life and hope. Lit at the [Easter Vigil](#), it's a focal point for the [Easter Season](#) and [baptisms](#), featuring symbols like the cross, [Alpha and Omega](#) (beginning and end), the year, and [incense grains](#) for Christ's wounds.

Easter Paschal Candle

It's hard to believe that while we're still celebrating the Christmas season, we're already looking ahead to the Lenten season, which begins on **February 28**, followed by **Palm Sunday on March 29** and **Easter Sunday on April 5**.

Most of our five parishes will need a new **Easter Paschal Candle**. We are inviting one family from each parish to donate **\$250** toward the purchase of a candle. Your intention for this candle will be printed in the parish bulletin for the entire month of April. Donations will be accepted on a **first-come, first-served basis**.
