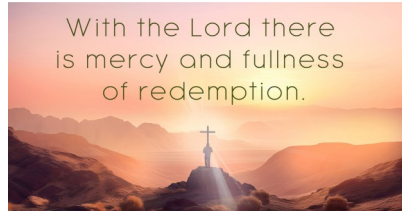

## SAINTS OF THE WEEK

### **SAINT TORIBIO DE MOGROVEJO (1538-1606) March 23**

In times of crisis, God always “surprises” the Church with unlikely saints, through whom Christ’s light radiates beyond their local communities to illumine the universal Church. Charles Borromeo was such a saint: appointed Archbishop of Milan at twenty-one by his papal uncle, epitomizing the corruption that the Reformers condemned, Charles instead inspired a revival that reinvigorated a Church devastated by the Reformation. His less well-known contemporary, Toribio de Mongrovejo, was God’s “saintly surprise” in the New World. Spanish-born lawyer, professor, head of the feared Inquisition, Toribio was still a layman when a grateful king appointed him Archbishop of far-off Lima. Once in Peru, however, Toribio was appalled at the abuse of indigenous peoples by the occupying *conquistadores*—his fellow countrymen—and by the complicity of the clergy. He became the natives’ devoted advocate, building churches, schools, hospitals, and the first seminary in the Americas, publishing catechisms and prayerbooks in the native languages he painstakingly mastered. Four hundred years later, whenever Pope Benedict welcomes Latin American bishops to Rome, he always invokes “the shining example of San Toribio.” Peter Scagnelli

### **HOLY WEEK AND THE PASCHAL TRIDUUM Sunday, March 28 - Sunday, April 4, 2010**

“The days of Jesus’ life-giving death and glorious resurrection are approaching, the hour he triumphed over Satan’s pride, the time we celebrate the great event of our redemption” (Preface of the Lord’s Passion II, *Sacramentary*). Thus the Church begins the one week of the year that we formally designate as “Holy.” Simple rituals can link the domestic church to parish church and Church universal. Enthroned Sunday’s palms where you pray, behind the family crucifix, even as part of front door decorations: “Christ reigns here,” they proclaim; “all are welcome!” During the first three days of Holy Week, ready Easter clothes, prepare festival foods, clean the house, and beautify the yard. Late Holy Thursday afternoon, share Lent’s final meal before the Lord’s Supper Mass. Pitcher, bowl, and towel make a fitting centerpiece; perhaps conclude the meal by washing each other’s feet. On Good Friday, observe the paschal fast from food—from TV and computer, too! Then come to Holy Saturday’s Vigil with mind clear, stomach empty, and heart full of “holy anticipation” that bursts into living flame when the new fire is kindled. Peter Scagnelli

# REFLECTIONS

## *Inspiration Daily - Jesus' Timing*

Jesus loved Mary, Martha, and Lazarus, so He waited. This is such a difficult passage to swallow. Like Martha who cries to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died," we, too, cry out to Jesus when the answers we seek are long in coming.

I found the disciples' reaction to Jesus' decision to wait in place, then go back to Judea, to be fascinating. They are concerned for Jesus' wellbeing as the Jews in Judea had recently tried to stone Jesus. I had to pause and wonder if, perhaps, they had been glad during the two day wait. Perhaps they were sad for Jesus since His friend was sick, but glad for themselves because they weren't going to go back to a place of danger.

Then, Jesus announces it's time to go back. The surprise and shock are evident, especially in Thomas's defeated statement that they are going to their death. It would seem that no one is very pleased with Jesus' timing.

What do we do when Jesus' timing is not our own? The Gospel offers us two options. The first is that of the disciples. They are resistant, uncertain, and while they do go along with Jesus, they lack an attitude of trust in His wisdom. Then there is Martha, who also wonders and questions Jesus' timing. However, she makes a bold statement of faith immediately afterwards, demonstrating that she trusts Jesus knows what He's doing even if she doesn't.

"But even now, I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you" (John 11:22).

Martha's faith is not dependent on her knowledge of Jesus' plans. The plans and timing aren't the important thing. Her focus is on the person of Jesus, the Son of God. Nothing is too impossible for Him, even if it seems beyond our measure of understanding. Kate Taliaferro

## *The Word In Our Lives - Greater Than You Expect*

Sometimes a prophet says more than he intended. Ezekiel in the first reading is talking about restoring Israel after the Babylonian exile. The Jews saw the Exile as punishment for their sins, especially the sin of relying on false gods or political leaders for their safety. God demonstrates forgiveness by bringing them back to Israel; God also shows them divine power and glory so that they return to the Lord for their protection.

Ezekiel uses the image of the dead rising from their graves (37:12). Jesus came to show us God in a new way and to fulfill the promises of all previous prophecies. Notice how the first reading repeats two phrases: "open your graves" and "know that I am the Lord." Jesus demonstrates that God's promise is much greater than anything Ezekiel expected.

First, the Gospel. When Jesus went to the tomb of Lazarus, he apparently waited till his friend had died. He knew that he was going to raise Lazarus from death to help his disciples believe. So why was he "perturbed and deeply troubled"? It could be that he was disappointed that his friends did not seem to believe that he could raise Lazarus. Notice Jesus became perturbed again when some of the crowd question Jesus' ability to do so (John 11:37-38). Like Ezekiel, the people of Jesus' time did not expect him literally to raise the dead. But God used the prophet's message to prepare for Jesus' message that not only would he rise from the dead, but we will also. And like the friends and relatives of Lazarus, we too may find it hard to believe, or at least question how it could be possible. Fortunately, Jesus helps with that, too.

Look at the second reading to the Romans. Because we have God's Spirit living in us, we who are sinners can be raised to new life by that Spirit. When our sins are forgiven, we begin to live a new life by loving the people we hurt by our sins, forgiving people who have hurt us, being more concerned for the poor than for our own comfort. We are freed from worrying about the future, from holding onto grudges, and perhaps even from the fear of death itself—all because we have experienced the new life of God's Spirit and, as Ezekiel says, know that God is the Lord. ## *Jesus Wept*

We might think Jesus had nothing to cry about. After all, he knows that the life we experience after earthly death is the point at which our eyes are opened and our hearts are completely filled at last. He knows that he will soon raise Lazarus from the dead, and everyone will be rejoicing and their sorrow forgotten. So, why did he weep?

It seems he wept at the sight of others' sorrow; he saw Mary and the others grieving over Lazarus' death and became "perturbed and deeply troubled," and he wept. This is a profound insight into the very Heart of the Savior – a compassionate heart truly entering into the sorrow of others and reaching out to alleviate their pain.

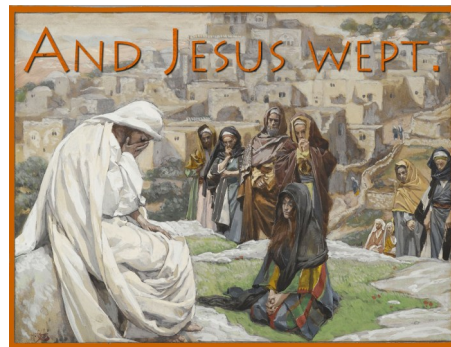
He is again "perturbed" when some of the bystanders suggest that he was unable to do anything about this, that he should have done something earlier to save Lazarus. What caused this agitation was not that he took personal offense at their doubtfulness. His Heart is always for others first! His pain was caused by their continued lack of faith, which was detrimental to THEM, not to him. He is the Savior and Redeemer, who calls them to believe and trust.

Jesus is also a Teacher, who does not miss any "teachable moment." So, as he is about to perform this extraordinary act, he wants to make sure that the lessons are understood clearly. One of these lessons is that Jesus only does what the Father wills, that his power over sickness and demons and death itself is the will of the Father and comes from the Father ("Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me.") but it is truly also HIS power. In the Gospel, Jesus never asks the Father to do the healing, the casting out, or the raising from the dead; he speaks directly for himself. "He cried out in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!' The dead man came out."

In this one scene, Jesus is accomplishing many things, "for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it":

- Jesus shows he is beyond any fear of perceived danger by returning to the people who had rejected him and tried to stone him to death.
- Jesus reminds the disciples that he walks by a greater light, and they can too.
- Jesus strengthens the faith of those present and declares, "I am the resurrection and the life."
- Jesus raises the one he loves, four days after he died.
- Jesus restores a brother to two grieving sisters.
- Jesus demonstrates his divine power to the bystanders and the disciples.
- Jesus draws many others to believe in him.

This Lent, has my faith deepened? Do I believe that whatever God allows is for a greater good, for His greater glory? Do I trust that his love and mercy never fail and will ultimately relieve every sorrow? Is my heart freer to receive the fullness of redemption in Christ?



## **TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

Today, we know more about the beginnings of Lent than our ancestors did. We know that Lent is first of all about baptism, and secondly that it is about the desire of all the baptized to renew the power and potential of that sacrament at Easter. For centuries, this deep truth was largely obscured, but today documents have come to light to reshape the Church's thinking and practice.

One source, discovered in the 1880s, is the pilgrim diary of a Spanish nun, Egeria, writing her sisters a detailed travelogue of a fourth-century sojourn in Jerusalem during Holy Week. She describes in vivid detail her participation in liturgies that are close cousins of our own Holy Week prayer, from a festive procession with palms to a procession to the cross. Her greatest delight is in the huge number of elect: men, women, and children who experience a time of deep retreat and identification with Christ's cross, guided by the bishop and supported by their godparents' constant nurture. The discovery of Egeria's diary proved to be a moment of grace for the Church; after a long period of "ecclesial amnesia," we know at last that baptism is really the work of a whole community of faith, convened by God.
